

## Mason Libraries in the News

The Council of Library and Information Resources (CLIR) has named GMU University Libraries among the 2009 recipients of funding from their "Uncovering Hidden Collections" program. The library's project involves a collection of 7300 posters from the former German Democratic Republic (GDR) that document East German film, theater, opera, visual art, politics, festivals, sports, and recreation dating from 1949 to 1990. Together, these posters comprise a unique scholarly resource that provides a window into the artistic, cultural, and political activities of the former GDR.

The GMU Libraries recently acquired access to **Biology Image Library**, www.biologyimagelibrary.com. The Biology Image Library is an online collection of images, movies, illustrations and animations across biology and biomedicine that are useful for research and education. The library is published by BioMed Central, an independent publishing house that offers a wide variety of journals and other online services. BioMed Central is committed to providing immediate open access to peerreviewed biomedical research. Most of the material is available to download for noncommercial purposes, such as for use in lectures or seminars. Some images in the library are in the public domain and you are free to use this material as you wish. In other cases, the Biology Image Library may be able to sell you commercial use rights to an image or direct you to the copyright holder to obtain these rights.
