NetLibrary eBooks are available twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week - from any location in the world, with additional features such as a dictionary, index, and easy keyword searchability.

NetLibrary Collection IV includes new content from the top academic and trade publishers in subjects suited for academic and public libraries. The collection has some new editions of the more popularly used titles in subjects ranging from business and computer science to education, literature, history, reference, and much more. It contains 7,659 titles and 10,677 copies. The emphasis is on current (2004) titles forward.
